No interruptions are allowed. ▪ Between 1 and 5 years: US\$3,000 FOB. 30 days of interruptions per year are allowed. ▪ More than 5 years: US\$5,000 FOB. 30 days of interruptions per year are allowed. ▪ If the value of the goods was more than USD 5,000 FOB, all the goods may be imported, however the foreign citizen shall pay the duties and taxes for the declared overage. ▪ This benefit is eligible under this Customs Tariff Schedule every 3 years. ▪ Free re-importation of goods is possible. Copies of the supporting export documents will be needed. ▪ Only 1% of duty is charged based on CIF value. ▪ Deadline to Import goods: the shipment(s) should arrive in conjunction with, or within 120 days before or after the beneficiary's arrival in the country. Otherwise duties and taxes of the whole amount to be imported shall be paid. ▪ If no tax exemptions are possible: 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Time of Dispatch: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Air and Land 3 working days. ▪ FCL 5 working days. ▪ LCL 7 working days. ▪ Almost all HHG shipments are subject to Customs Verification and Agricultural Inspection (SAG). ▪ In case of having a proceeding re-importation free, the customs verification is obligatory to check the old and the new items in the declaration. ▪ In order to obtain the Travel Certificate, the customer has to be in Chile since the latest entry stamp must appear in his or her passport.

They may import up to US\$5,000.00 FOB in which case, only 1% duty is charged based on the CIF value. ▪ Shipments over US\$5,000.00 FOB are subject to Custom duties (over the excess of this amount). ▪ If the visa is still in process, it is possible to clear under bonded storage in the importer's residence. Showing copy of the VISA APPLICATION IN PROCESS. Official visa, stamped in the passport must be shown to the customs service before 90 days. ▪ If the required visa is not presented the whole shipment is subject to Custom duties. ▪ A maximum of two shipments subject to exemption benefits may be imported from the same origin; one with personal effects and a second one with the household goods. The sum of both shipments shall not exceed USD 5,000 FOB. Removal Goods – Air Shipments		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ New Customs Regulations effective 29 November 2018 - the import procedure has changed for all the AIR SHIPMENTS weighting 300 kilos or more with immediately effect: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Thorough inspection for shipments over 300 kilos (660 lbs) gross: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All shipments will require an additional thorough inspection performed by the moving company at airport facilities. This is additional to the Customs inspection that is always performed. The fully inspection will delay clearance in 1 or 2 days and will increase destination and storage charges. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The moving companies will not be liable for additional charges and/or the consequences for not meeting these mandatory requirements. ▪ Some of the consequences can be fines, additional charges, retention of the goods, destruction of the forbidden goods and smuggling prosecution.

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		<p>2. Detailed Packing list:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Like some other countries, Chilean Customs Authorities are requesting a fully detailed packing list, especially with clothing, electronics and wooden items. This request is mandatory for all air shipments regardless the weight. ▪ Wooden items must be indicated in the Packing list (furniture, ornaments, picture or painting frames, among others). ▪ A detailed item by item list is required. For example, the clothes must indicate the number of pants, shirts, shoes, etc. ▪ Electronic devices must indicate type, brand name, model and serial number. ▪ If the goods are placed in 2 or more crates, the packing list must indicate which items are in which crate. 	
<p>Motor Vehicles - Returning Citizens</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ New Vehicles: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Commercial Invoice ▪ Vehicle Property Title ▪ Used Vehicles: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Franchise request form, which must be signed in person at the Customs Service. ▪ Original Waybill (BL). ▪ Travel Certificate: this document has a validity of 30 days. ▪ Notarized Sworn Statement, declaring permanent residency in the country. ▪ Terminal Container Receipt. ▪ Commercial Invoice of the vehicle, or notarized sworn statement declaring the value of the vehicle. ▪ Technical Specifications Form of the vehicle. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Chilean citizens who are returning to the country may import one new or used vehicle, while paying full customs duties and taxes corresponding to each case. ▪ Used vehicles (new requirements as from 13 June 2017): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Only allowed for returning Chilean citizens who have stayed abroad for at least 18 months verified by Travel Certificate (issued in Chile). 60 days of interruptions per year are allowed. ▪ The importation is subject to duties and taxes - duties of approx. 26%. ▪ The used car must be shipped from the same country of residence of the returning citizen. ▪ The used car must come from 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Cars import for returning citizens: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The returning citizens will need to go personally to the Customs authority at the port of entry to request the import. ▪ This would be needed with at least 5 working days in advance of shipment arrival.

Therefore, new or used vehicle, must be imported under the name of their spouse, while paying the respective duties and taxes, ▪ In the instance that the household goods as well as the vehicle are dispatched from origin in the same shipment, the Bill of Lading must specify the name of both owners. ▪ In the case of operations originating in USA a Fumigation Certificate must be submitted

<p>Motor Vehicles - Foreign Diplomats and International Officials</p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ They shall be exempt from paying the duties and taxes only when it is one new vehicle. ▪ In the case of a used vehicle, Customs grants temporary admission extendable until the end of its mission in Chile through a TITV or Declaration of Temporary Admission. ▪ In the case of operations originating in USA a Fumigation Certificate must be submitted for the used vehicle, either if it is shipped alone in the container or along with household goods. 	
<p>Motorcycles</p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Only new allowed. ▪ The entrance of used motorcycles into the country is completely forbidden. 	
<p>Bicycles</p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ As of December 2014 are admitted free of taxes only those considered as a sport article or city bikes, which in number may not exceed the members of the family group. ▪ This regulation is applicable for both Chileans, foreigners and diplomats in general.

Fumigation of wood packaging		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ The Chilean Government adopted ISPM-15 (International standards for Phytosanitary Measures Publication 15) Guidelines for Regulating Wood Packaging Material in International Trade (aka NIFM-15) to standardise the treatment of wood packing materials used for the transport of goods. ▪ Shipments into or out of the country in wooden packaging, need to have a Seal, certifying that the shipment has received the required treatment (HT = Heated Treatment [a minimum wood core temperature of 56°C for a minimum of 30 minutes] or fumigation 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ This regulation DOES NOT apply to wood packing materials manufactured of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Raw wood of 6 mm thickness or less ▪ Processed wood produced by glue, heat and pressure, or a combination thereof. ▪ Plywood sheets & agglomerated sawdust sheet. ▪ Oriented wooden fibre sheets. ▪ Sawdust & Wooden fibre.

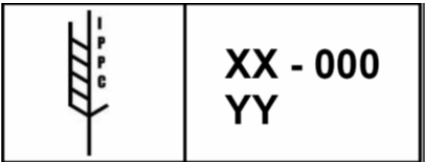
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- with Methyl Bromide (MT).
- The minimum temperature should not be less than 10°C and the minimum exposure time should not fall below 16 hours.
- The treatments established in the present regulation have the intent to reduce the introduction and/or the dissemination of quarantine plagues associated to the wood packing.
- The wood packing material must be marked in a visible location on each article, on at least two opposite sides of the article with a legible and permanent mark in black ink. Labels and adhesives are not allowed.
- The approved format of the mark should be as follows:



- Where XX is the country code, 000 the producer number, YY the treatment type, and AAA the inspection agency logo.
- If a shipment arrives without this seal, it will be returned to the origin country at the shipper's/ origin agent's expenses.



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
